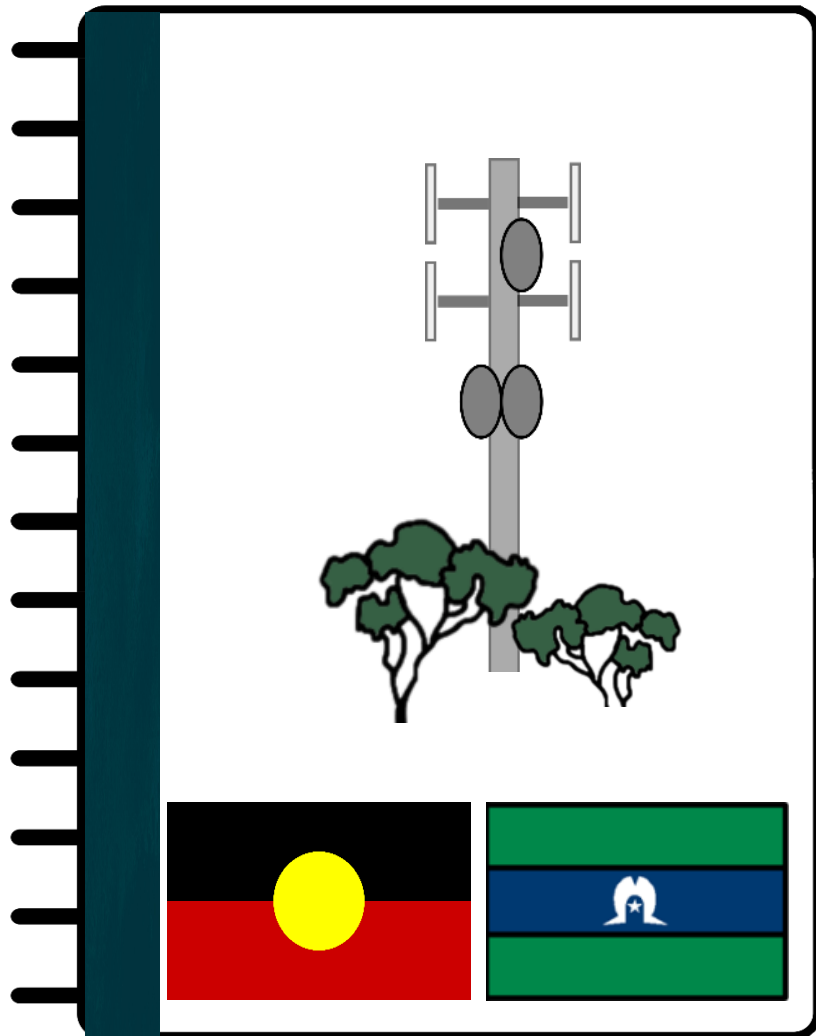

- small town.



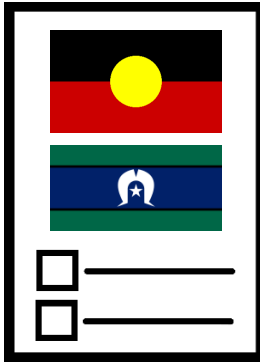
We respect

You may use a different word. Like Indigenous.



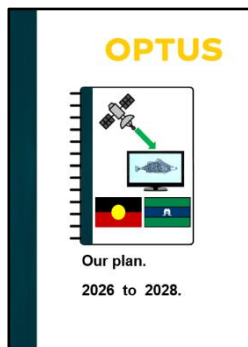
We have a plan.

- Torres Strait Islander people.

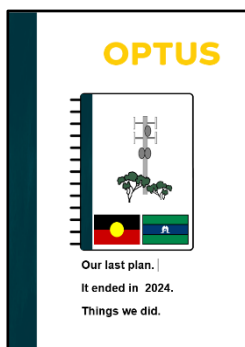
We call this plan a RAP.

We call it data.



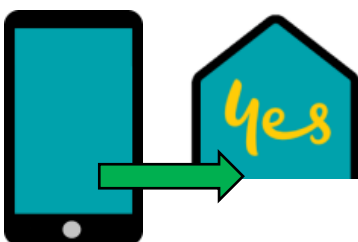
You need data to use apps. Like Face book.

You may only use some of your data.

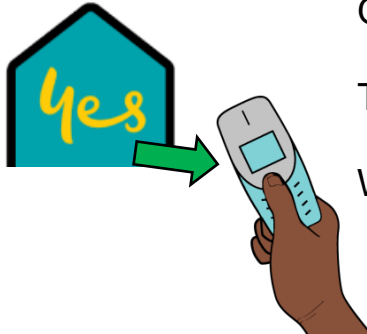
You have some data left each month.

It helped young people stay at

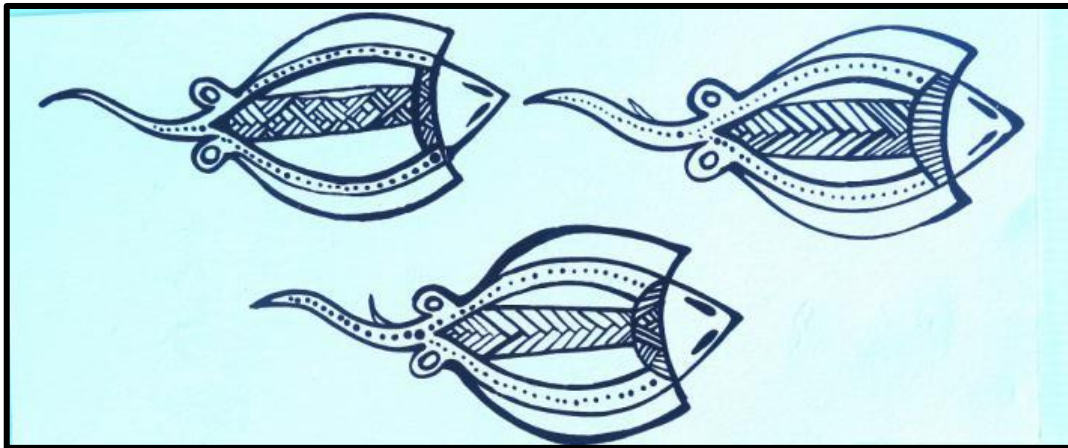
- high school

- work. They are an apprentice.



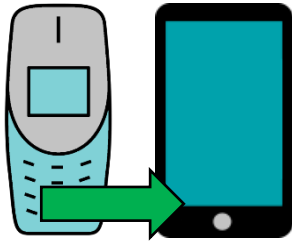
Most of these young people got some free data.

- be safe.

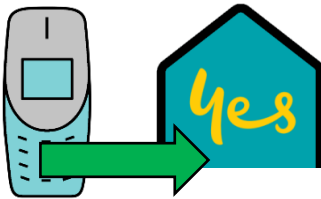

You may get a new phone.



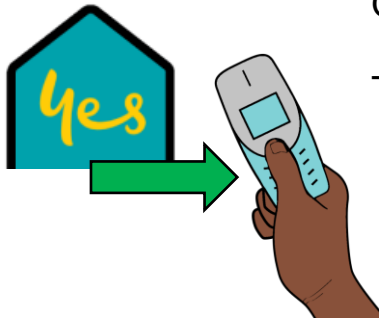
Some people gave us their old phone.

- Bars Behind Me. They help Aboriginal women.

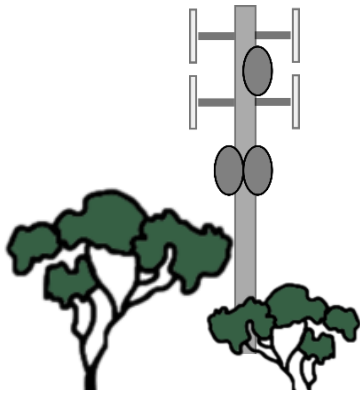
It is when the women get out of jail.

Phones work better in Yarrabah now. Like

- you are hurt. You can call an ambulance
- you go to the shop. You can pay with a card
- you need a special doctor.

They are in Brisbane.

You can talk to them on the internet.



Some places helped build the tower. It was

- the Australian Government
- the Queensland Government
- Indara. They build lots of phone towers.

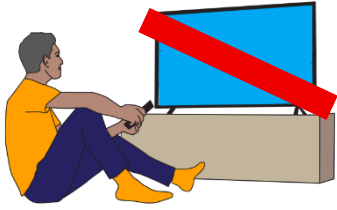
They look after these towers.

- Dave Morrisey. He is from Optus.

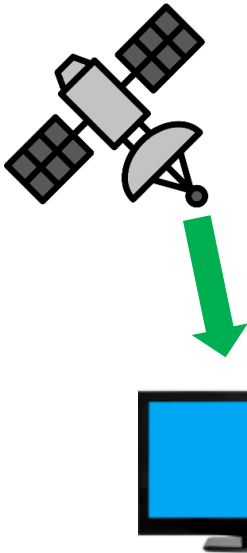


More things we did.

It is very high in the sky. We call it a satellite.

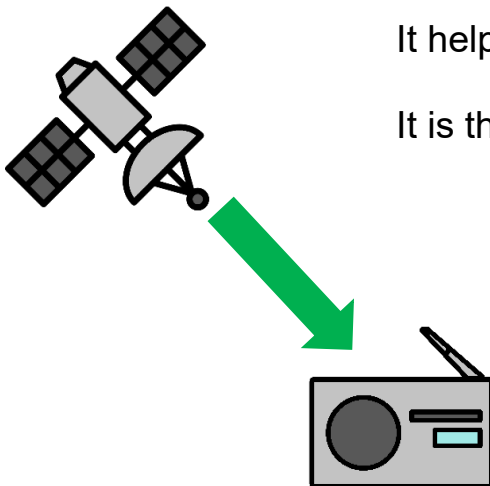
Optus uses this machine. It helps you get

- radio.



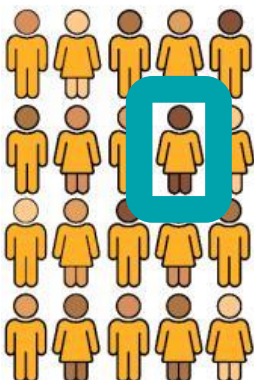
It helps you see

It is 1 in 20 Australians. We call it VAST.

Its long name is

Viewer Access Satellite Television.

- got help to find good staff.

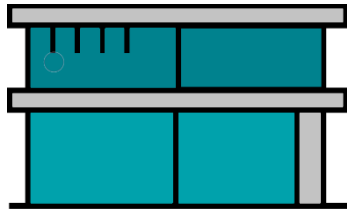


Optus buys things for our work. Like

They went to the Indigenous Nationals. It was in Perth.
We gave them money. It helped them go to Perth.

We helped sports events. Like

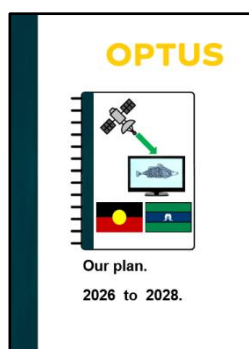
- for rugby league. It was the Koori Knockout.

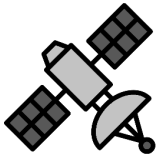
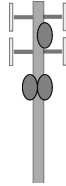
